
There is a hermit crab in Legoland, England, that lives in a shell made of Lego.

In the 19th century, the steam train was invented using a steam engine. The steam that powers the pistons of the engine is created by burning coal.

Heat warms up the water to make steam.

Steam moves the piston.

The piston powers the wheels.





2. GODS AND GODDESSES



In one famous scene we can see one of the ships over the White House in Washington DC. It later goes on to destroy it.



A surprising number of people fell for this scam.


The New York police made lots of people take down tollbooths they had set up.

No ears we can see but penguins have very good hearing


Dark feathers on their back disguise them from predators above

Thick oily feathers to keep out the cold


Webbed feet to make swimming easier

The emperor is the biggest species of penguin.




China


Cats were so important to Egyptians that they would risk their lives to save their pets if the house caught fire. And when a cat died, the owner would shave off their eyebrows as a sign of mourning.

Ancient Egyptians sometimes turned their cats into mummies. After the cat died, its body was preserved with spices and placed in a decorated coffin.

The Egyptians believed that the cat would be born again in the afterlife and so would need its body. Mummified cats have been found in many Egyptian burial sites.



Cats have been popular on ships since ancient times. They stop rats getting into food supplies, which can make the crew and passengers ill.



The top three most dangerous jobs

Number three - bush pilot

Being a bush pilot is the third most dangerous job in the world!

Bush pilots fly small aircraft into some of the most remote places on Earth, such as the icy lands of Alaska or the dense bush of Africa.


Number two - deep sea fisherman

Deep sea fishermen do the second most dangerous job in the world. They spend days or weeks at sea, in some of the most hostile environments on earth.

To catch the fish we eat, they often have to deal with:

- freezing temperatures
- rough weather
- sudden storms
- icy decks
- heavy machinery

Every year, many deep sea fishermen are badly injured or die at work.



3. NO HIDING PLACE

Disappearing forests

Our planet is covered in huge forests that are home to thousands of species of mammals, birds and insects.

The animals that live in forests need the trees for food and shelter. If the forests disappear so do the animals, especially primates such as monkeys and apes.



Orangutans are the largest mammals that live in trees. In the past 20 years, 80% of the rainforest where they live has been destroyed by illegal logging. That is when trees are cut down to make timber for building homes, furniture and other goods.

Another big threat to orangutans and other wildlife is the destruction of the rainforest to plant trees for palm oil. Palm oil is used to increase the shelf life of goods, so they can be on sale longer in shops and supermarkets.

Every hour, an area of rainforest the size of 300 football pitches is destroyed for palm oil trees.



Record breakers

In 1930, the world's tallest building was the Woolworth Building in New York. It was 241 metres high.

Then, between 1930 and 1931 it was overtaken by three buildings:



Today, the world's tallest building is the **Burj Khalifa** in Dubai.

It is 828 metres high. To picture something that tall, think of more than 100 normal houses on top of one another!

It took five years to build.



You can watch the sun set from the bottom of the Burj Khalifa. Then if you speed up the lift to floor 162 you can watch the sun set again!
